

However, it would be a mistake to turn into a cynic.



1) We've stopped fighting each other.













Life Expectancy in the 20th Century







Victimizations per 100,000 people ages 12 and older













Incidence of Selected Diseases in the United States











Figure 7. The share of US primary energy demand from 1780-2100 demonstrates the substitutional nature of shifts in the generation mix, a trend that we believe is likely to continue








Average Price After Discount for PDAs/Smartphones and All Handsets⁸³¹






