

In New Ad, Jeb Bush Blasts John Kasich Over Not-So-Conservative Record

In the days before the crucial New Hampshire presidential primary, Republican governors battle it out on the airwaves over their respective conservative bona fides.

A <u>new ad from Jeb Bush</u> takes aim at fellow Republican Ohio Gov. John Kasich for lacking a conservative record like Bush built during two terms as Florida's executive-in-chief.

The attack follows Kasich's well-received performance at Friday's ABC News GOP debate.

"No Comparison," is a <u>nearly 90-second ad</u> comparing Kasich's record to Bush's on several issues, suggesting Bush is far more conservative than Kasich.

On guns, the Bush ad points out that as a congressman, Kasich voted in 1994 to ban assault weapons. In contrast, Bush, "earned an A-plus rating from the NRA."

The ad blasts Kasich efforts to expand Medicaid in Ohio, with Bush saying, "I don't think we should be expanding a broken insurance system."

A clip shows a younger Kasich saying, "I spent an entire career trying to reign in defense spending," followed by Bush responding, "We need to rebuild the military. As president I will be a commander-in-chief that will have the back of the military."

The ad also notes that the Cato Institute ranked Kasich a D rating for his state budget, versus Florida under Bush with the addition of 1.3 million jobs, 4.4 percent growth and eight balanced budgets.

"That is a conservative record," said Fox News host Sean Hannity.

In an interview on Sunday, Kasich called the ad "desperation."
