

## Questionable study

The recent letter to the editor by James Simmons, Sr. reported on a study by the Center for Immigration Studies (CIS) regarding the use of welfare programs by immigrants, either legal or illegal. The CIS has a well documented bias towards immigrants, and an even better documented history of producing studies that rely on cherry-picked data, use of biased methodology, data manipulation, and questionable logic. Groups who have criticized CIS findings include the libertarian CATO Institute and the liberal Southern Poverty Law Center.

The CIS position regarding immigration is that we should allow no immigration at all. Their "findings" in their studies will always support that express agenda.
