

Letter: Additional gun laws not the best solution

Denny Kubal's Jan. 31 letter "GOP absent on gun safety legislation" does not prove that more gun control laws would reduce gun deaths. When you study the states and major cities with the highest gun deaths, you will find they have the strictest gun control laws.

News flash: Criminals do not obey gun laws, nor any criminal laws. We currently have more than 20,000 gun laws on the books, none of which have ever been proven to prevent any crimes with firearms. Yet Kubal thinks passing one more gun control law would reduce criminals using firearms in committing a crime.

He refuses to accept state Rep. Jim Lucas' belief that "responsible gun use is not the problem" and the statistics presented. He apparently subscribes to using Rahm Emanuel's well-known tactic that "you never want a serious crisis to go to waste" to promote the progressive agenda. The gun deaths in Indianapolis are the result of gang members and young people who have no respect for others and obtain their weapons illegally. Where are the parents who fail to teach their kids respect for others? Or fail to know they have firearms acquired illegally?

According to "A Guide to Mass Shootings in America," of the 137 guns possessed by the killers, more than three-quarters were obtained legally, as none of them had a criminal background and passed the FBI check for purchasing a firearm.
