

Income Redistribution: Work to Welfare

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Forget troublesome unemployment rates. With welfare like the Obama administration offers, who needs a job? According to a recent Cato Institute report, "The current welfare system provides such a high level of benefits that it acts as a disincentive for work." In 35 states, welfare pays more than the federal minimum wage of \$7.25 per hour, and in 13 states welfare pays more than \$15 per hour. It's hardly a shock, then, that welfare's ranks are growing.

Last month marked another new record for the number of households receiving food stamps — 23,116,928. And while in 2008, 28.2 million individuals received food stamps, in 2012 that number hit 46.6 million, with concomitant costs spiking from almost \$35 billion in 2008 to approximately \$80 billion four years later. Barack Obama has apparently taken this as a mandate not to encourage welfare-to-work but, what else, to offer food stamps to illegal immigrants.
