So what's it all about?

If you toddle on over to the <u>link</u> associated with that ad, you'll find the following enticing pitch, aimed at the young plutocrat just starting out, looking to make his or her mark in the world:

The Koch Associate Program is a challenging job opportunity in DC for professionals who are passionate about free-market ideas, and want to become more effective at advancing liberty throughout their careers. The Charles G. Koch Charitable Foundation's aim is to develop the capabilities of the Associates through the program by providing management training, professional development, and the knowledge and skills necessary to achieve their career potential.

Associates come from a wide range of backgrounds from recent college graduates to PhDs, former employees of the public and private sectors, and students of subjects from economics to communications. What distinguishes the Associates is the drive to effectively advance the ideas of liberty throughout their careers.

The 2010-11 program began on June 14, 2010 and ends in May 2011. While in the program, each Associate works four days a week in a full-time position at a <u>reputable</u> <u>non-profit organization</u> in DC. Job opportunities are as diverse as Associates, and range from policy research to communication and public relations. Each position gives Associates valuable professional experience pursuing their talents and interests, with the opportunity to earn greater responsibility and expand their roles by performing well.

So who are these "reputable non-profits"? Hmmmm....

And that's just the D.C. list, consisting of lots and lots of Koch-funded 501c3s. There are also non-D.C. organizations, plus old timey conservative organizations like the Hudson Institute, the American Enterprise Institute, the American Spectator, the CATO Institute and the Federalist Society. Just how far do the Koch tentacles spread? Far, baby. Far.

So what do our little associates do during their sojourn in Kochland?

To develop the capabilities of each Associate, one day a week is spent immersed in a curriculum learning and applying <u>Market-Based Management</u>[®] (MBM[®]), a framework for understanding how an organization survives, prospers, and grows in the long term. They listen to speakers, engage in workshops, and discuss readings from a variety of disciplines with aims to better understand why free markets foster prosperous societies and how such principles can inspire the development of a prosperous organization. The expectation is that Associates gain knowledge and skills to effectively apply MBM tools and concepts in their full-time roles, getting better results by doing so.

To supplement the curriculum, the Foundation provides mentors who work one-on-one with Associates to help bridge the gap between the educational and professional aspects of the program. As the program nears completion, the mentors work with Associates and program staff to identify opportunities for engagement and employment <u>after the program</u>.

And the Kochs are <u>spreading their alumni around the conservative universe</u>, like so many little Ayn Rand seeds. Buth they're not limited to non-profits. Team Koch is also pollenating the media. The month of May starts a marathon of commencements across the nation as many students prepare to transition to another phase of their adult lives. May also begins the final month of the Koch Associate Program (KAP), a year-long nonprofit management training program for over 80 budding nonprofit leaders around Washington, D.C. KAP is sponsored by The Charles G. Koch Charitable Foundation, a major TFAS suppoter.

Both TFAS and the Koch Foundation share commitments to promoting free market economics and limited government and preparing young people for leadership. They also share talent pools. This year, the presence of TFAS alumni at the Koch Foundation is more notable than any other year.

Throughout 2008-2009, TFAS has hosted a Koch Associate, Patrice J. Lee, to manage media relations. Four other Koch Associates are part of the TFAS alumni network:

Amanda Berg (E 07) serves as a legislative assistant for the National Center for Policy Analysis.

Mike Horn (CSS 07) works at Americans for Prosperity as a development associate. Horn transitioned to the Associate program after spending last summer in the Koch Internship Program.

Dan Wityk (E 05) is a research assistant at the National Center for Policy Analysis.

Other previous Koch Associates include **Christie Fogarty** (**B 03**) who was a 2007 Freedom Scholar and now manages membership programs at the Heritage Foundation. **Wes Siler** (**CSS 06**) was also a Koch Associate. There is also a strong TFAS representation among Koch staff.

Koch Industries executives and employees also donated \$10,000 to help [former "Real World" cast member Sean] Duffy win retiring Democrat Dave Obey's seat and \$5,000 to De Pere Republican Reid Ribble's campaign to defeat Democrat Steve Kagen of Appleton. The PAC gave \$25,400 to Oshkosh businessman Ron Johnson's campaign to

oust Democrat Russ Feingold from the Senate and has contributed \$60,000 to Republican Rep. Paul Ryan since 1989.

This of course is nothing new, and there's nothing secret about it. The religious right has been doing much the same thing with fundamentalist-steeped law students from fourthtier Regent University, whose alumni populated the Bush administration.

But it is, I think, helpful to know what they're up to.
