The Cato Institute reports the 2016 "Freedom in the 50 States index" ranks California as one of the worst. The cause being that business owners currently lack the private freedom to gain the greatest benefit as land owners.

The authors set forth their recommendations to improve California's sorry state by:

- Eliminating the Coastal Commission authority to regulate private land use.
- Easing restrictions on business.
- Relaxing gambling restrictions.
- Renewing eminent domain laws by adding teeth where none exist.
