

## It's about the policies, not just the pipeline

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The Editorial page has been so informative lately. I especially like the one entitled "Keystone has nothing to do with gas prices." I'm sure the author did not intend to sound ostentatious and condescending by ending their submission with "any questions? Class dismissed."

Not using the Keystone pipeline does not have a "major" impact on prices, it does, however, have an impact when combined with the other policies of this administration, including the loss of jobs to build and maintain it. We import 6.6% of our oil from Russia (\$17.4 Billion in revenue) and 11% from OPEC. Pipelines currently move 70% of the oil in this country. Only 3% of domestic oil is transported by rail, yet the submitter provides a detailed description of the process.

In 2020, the U.S. exported more oil than it imported. No longer true. Pressure from this administration, which protects OPEC countries from its adversaries, also influence the price. Some folks don't seem to understand the National Security aspect of not being energy independent.

The point of objection is not Keystone alone, but the aggregate policies of the administration relative to the reduced oil production in this country. Part of the problem, in my view, is that green energy advocates get their information from loquacious and emotional teenagers and elitist who will not suffer from these inflated gas prices.

John Kerry is concerned that the invasion of a European country by Russia may distract from his Climate Change agenda.
