

Foxx speaks, dogs for Amtrak, T&I football - DeFazio blasts Mica chairmanship - Questions on driverless cars

THE LEDE — **Today in transportation:** It's another busy day in the transportation world. The highlights: Transportation Secretary Anthony Foxx and a slew of big transpo voices all speak at a U.S. Travel Association conference, House and Senate negotiators get together for the first formal WRDA conference and some dogs — oh, and lawmakers too — will be at Union Station to promote a bill letting pets on Amtrak. At least you can unwind after the busy day by watching your favorite House T&I members play some football against the Capitol Police.

TRANSIT AND HOTELS: In conjunction with the USTA conference, today APTA and USTA put out a new study looking at how rail-friendly cities with good transit connections between airports and hotels attract more travelers than "non-rail cities." Some key findings: The nightly room rate is nearly 50 percent more for hotels within a quarter-mile of a rail station and hotels in cities with a direct airport-downtown connection get 11 percent more revenue per room, totaling \$313 million extra in various "rail cities" around the country. http://bit.ly/17JIYhR

Still stuck: Also at today's conference, Building America's Future co-chair Ed Rendell will unveil a new version of his group's "I'm Stuck" app that lets Americans report transportation infrastructure problems to their member of Congress. The revised app has a new look, new interface and an option for bikers.

WOOF WOOF: Some furry four-legged friends will be on hand to help push for a bill that would let pets on Amtrak trains. Bill author and rail panel Chairman Jeff Denham will be joined by Steve Cohen, Michael Grimm, an official from the Pet Industry Joint Advisory Council and the Hallmark Channel's "pet lifestyle expert" and dog-trainer. The measure would let Amtrak riders take their pets on the train in a crate for an additional fee. http://bit.ly/HYnTmH

ARE YOU READY FOR SOME FOOTBALL? Some of the Hill's top transportation lawmakers sure are. The 6th biennial game pitting members of Congress against Capitol Police officers is tonight, and the House Transportation Committee will be well-represented on the congressional roster. Chairman Bill Shuster will be a coach for a team that includes Railroads Chairman Jeff Denham and fellow committee members Markwayne Mullin, Rodney Davis and Tim Walz. Infrastructure bank advocate Rep. John Delaney is also on the roster, as are Richard Hudson and Cedric Richmond, leaders of the Homeland Security panel with jurisdiction over the TSA. Proceeds from the \$10 tickets will go to the Capitol Police Memorial Fund, among other charities. The game starts at 7 p.m. at the D.C. Armory. HOW THE TIMES HAVE CHANGED: Rep. Peter DeFazio, in a chat with MT yesterday, ended up talking about just how bad committee relations got under then-T&I Chairman John Mica and how Shuster has turned things around: "Bill Shuster is a world of difference. We were actually, really consulted [on WRRDA]. Even though John Mica would say 50 times he had consulted with or shared [MAP-21] with us, he hadn't. We'd never seen anything. In fact I don't think they had seen it — I believe the original draft they passed out of the House committee was written by some outside interest group because some of the provisions were so crazy... This is way different; we're way back toward where we used to be. There's still some friction, some push and pull, but if you look at the water bill in the end, a lot of the tea party people who've been questioning the government's role in infrastructure came around. So hopefully it will continue to evolve."

MOST WANTED, DELAYED: The shutdown dominoes keep falling. The NTSB's "Most Wanted List" of its most important safety goals won't come out until early next year thanks to the 16-day government shutdown last month, according to an email from an agency official that was obtained by MT. The report is normally out in mid-November, the email reads, but "since we had the shutdown in October, we lost some ground and are facing a condensed calendar to complete other activities before the end of the year. As a consequence, we have decided to postpone the announcement of the Most Wanted List until January 16, 2014."

IT'S THE END OF THE TSA AS WE KNOW, AND CATO FEELS FINE: John Mica might regret creating the agency he now despises. But he's not the only TSA-hater out there. From Chris Edwards, the Cato Institute's director of tax policy studies: "We would be better off without a monolithic federal agency that controls all major aspects of aviation security. ... Congress should abolish TSA. The TSA activities that have not shown substantial benefits should be eliminated. Passenger and baggage screening — which represents about two-thirds of TSA's budget — should be moved to the control of airports and opened to competitive private bidding. And the remaining parts of TSA — including intelligence and analysis activities — should be moved to other federal agencies." More: http://bit.ly/l3tLMa
