Additionally, with passage of immigration reform, newly declared Americans who cannot speak English will be able to enroll in online English language classes that will expedite their ability to fill out resumes and obtain employment in all industry sectors as a legal U.S. Citizen.

Authorization of immigration reform laws will also impact foreign students who are currently attending a U.S. university. Many of these students who are pursuing advanced degrees in the mathematics, engineering and technology fields may be more inclined to remain in the U.S. as a highly qualified, contributory member of the economy if immigration laws are simplified. A report by the Reuters news agency cites Alex Nowrasteh, a Cato Institute immigration specialist, as stating that according to research, twice as many immigrants are more inclined to start small businesses than natural U.S. citizens.
