Charles and David Koch have posted <u>a response</u> to the recent *Washingtonian* <u>article</u> on the origins of the Kochs' lawsuit seeking to take control of the Cato Institute. Since I did <u>a post</u> on the original article, it's only fair that I link to the response as well.

That said, neither the original article nor this response include anything that changes my mind about the bottom line. I continue to believe that the Kochs' suit is ultimately a mistake likely to cause more harm than good, for reasons I <u>outlined back in March</u>. Even if the Kochs' position is legally correct (which is far from clear), this is one of those times when the best course of action is to refrain from exercising a legal right. There is <u>no violation of libertarian principle</u> in recognizing that. I still hope that this dispute will be resolved with as little damage to Cato and the libertarian movement as possible.
