

Cato: No Voter Fraud

Its conclusion?

"The voter ID issue is a hot one," writes Jim Harper, Director of Information Policy Studies at The Cato Institute. There isn't much evidence of that problem, and to worry about impersonation fraud at polling places, one has to put aside absentee ballot fraud, which is probably much easier, as well as election fraud – rigged vote counts, for example – which is much more efficient."
