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Booze on XMas? We'll drink to that

The Legislature voted last week to allow liquor sales on Sunday morning and Christmas Day. It didn't go unnoticed by Poli-Bites that the sponsor of the Christmas Day sales amendment, Sen. Gilda Jacobs, is Jewish. Nothing to do with religion, laughed the Huntington Woods Democrat, although she said many Jewish friends complain about the Sunday morning liquor ban (which by most accounts was imposed in deference to Sunday morning Christian church services). Jacobs did recall a Jewish restaurant owner who complained that he couldn't cater a private party with alcohol on Christmas Eve. "This guy lost out on a big night of a sale, and it just didn't seem fair," she said. In fact, Jacobs has been pushing for Sunday morning liquor sales for years, saying the current Prohibitionera ban is antiquated and hurts businesses. Current law bans alcohol sales from 9 p.m. Christmas Eve and all of Christmas Day. A new law, if Gov. Jennifer Granholm signs the bill, would ban sales from 11:59 p.m. Dec. 24 through noon Dec. 25. Jacobs said boaters also complain that they can't stock up on alcohol provisions Sunday mornings for their Sunday excursions.

For the record, South Carolina Gov. **Mark Sanford** got the highest score -- 74 -- even while his wife was dumping him. Sanford, you'll recall, is the guy who said he was "hiking on the Appalachian Trail" when he was really with his Argentinean mistress. He is not seeking reelection.
