

US Will Find Iran Noncompliant With Nuclear Deal

The Iranian Foreign Ministry announced that Tehran will not allow any party to enter facilities that do not fall within the nuclear agreement.

When Iran signed an agreement with world powers to curb its nuclear program in 2015 in exchange for the lifting of worldwide sanctions, President Hassan Rouhani's administration believed the deal would usher in badly needed foreign direct investment to relieve Iran's economic woes.

He also accused the USA of exploiting the issue "for ill-wishing political means".

An Iranian lawmaker said on Monday that the UN Resolution 2231 is predicated on the closure of Iran's military case and its exclusion from the country's nuclear case.

Analysts say recent actions by the US demonstrate that President Donald Trump plans to renege on the Iran nuclear agreement.

"We will continue to cooperate with the agency in line with previous commitments and we will certainly not cross any of the red lines set by the Islamic Republic of Iran", Bahram Qassemi said in an interview with the IRIB news agency.

The US Treasury in July pressed new sanctions against Tehran over its ballistic missile program and human rights record.

"He's given strong indications that he's just not going to recertify it", said John Glaser, director of foreign policy studies at the Cato Institute, the libertarian think tank.

The accord took effect in January 2016 and was supposed to terminate all nuclear-related sanctions against Iran all at once, but its implementation has been hampered mainly due to U.S. policies.

Glaser said the other parties to the agreement "agree that Iran is compliance with the deal and agree that the deal should be kept in place because it's a robust, nonproliferation agreement".

Last week, Iranian President Hassan Rouhani threatened to quit the nuclear pact if the White House issues new sanctions.

A senior military adviser to Iran's supreme leader said that inspecting Iranian military sites under the pretext of the global nuclear deal is "impossible", state TV reported.
