## More Cost Data and Better Debt Insight

Data-transparent government is still a ways off, but some small steps forward are underway. To wit, my project <u>WashingtonWatch.com</u>, which is adding <u>new data going to</u> the costs of bills in Congress.

As detailed in an <u>announcement that went up this morning</u>, many more bills on the site will have cost estimates associated with them, the product of research being done at the <u>National Taxpayers Union Foundation</u>. Some bills spend pennies or less per U.S. family. Some spend \$5,000 per family and more. Wouldn't you like to know which are which?

The site has also begun displaying national debt information on a per-family, per-person, and per-couple basis. (Your debt—just for being an American—is about \$45,000 dollars.)

I'll have much more to say on government transparency in the coming months.
