Thomas Jefferson and the Internet lecture in Washington Crossing, Pa.

WASHINGTON CROSSING, Pa. -- "The Continuing Saga of Thomas Jefferson and the Internet," is the title of the lecture to be offered by David G. Post at the David Library of the American Revolution on Thursday, October 13 at 7:30 PM.

The lecture is the second in a series on the Constitution of the United States being offered over the autumn months by the Library, which is located at 1201 River Road, Washington Crossing.

David G. Post is the author of "Jefferson's Moose: Notes on the State of Cyberspace," a book that recreates Thomas Jefferson's "Notes on the State of Virginia" for Internet age. Post is the I. Herman Stern Professor of Law at the Beasley School of Law at Temple University, where he teaches intellectual property law and the law of cyberspace. He is also a Fellow at the Center for Democracy and Technology, a Fellow of the Institute for Information Law and Policy at New York Law School, and an Adjunct Scholar at the Cato Institute. He has been a regular columnist for the American Lawyer and InformationWeek, a commentator on the Lehrer News Hour, Court TV's Supreme Court Preview, NPR's All Things Considered, BBC's World, and recently was featured in the PBS documentary The Supreme Court. He also sings and plays guitar, piano, banjo, and harmonica in the bands "Bad Dog," "The Dwights," and "The Zen Cohens."

In his lecture, Post will examine Thomas Jefferson's views on the First Amendment, the Copyright Clause of Article One, and how those views impact our use of the Internet today.
