

Anti-climate change letter is 'too clever by half'

A March 27 letter, "Science helps dupe people about climate change," is too clever by half.

His anti-climate change source, Dr. Richard Lindzen, formerly of MIT and now at the Cato Institute, has been taken to task by 22 of his former colleagues who wrote, "As (Lindzen's) colleagues at MIT in the Program in Atmospheres, Oceans and Climate, all of whom are actively involved in understanding climate, we write to make it clear that this is not a view shared by us, or by the overwhelming majority of other scientists who have devoted their professional lives to careful study of climate science."
