# **Grants awarded to Paint Branch High School staff**

The Board of Directors of the Paint Branch High School Educational Foundation announced the recipients of five mini-grants to Paint Branch High School staff. The total amount of the four mini-grants was almost \$2,000. They will benefit the following programs at the school:

Body Bars for Total Fitness Class — Michelle Chestnut, Total Fitness Physical Education Teacher. Due to a larger than expected enrollment in the Total Fitness class, more equipment is needed for the students. A \$500 grant provides body bars with various weights for students. Fitness Bar Charts and a DVD for classroom use will also be purchased.

French Exchange Trip to France — Barbara Whitney, French Teacher. Students from France visited Paint Branch this fall, and Paint Branch French students will travel to France, visit Paris for three days, and travel to Besançon where they will stay with local families, go to school, and go on field trips. A \$500 grant will help defray the costs of the trip and help ensure students who want to go are able attend.

Outdoor Pit Firing — Alice Norris, Ceramics Teacher. This \$395 grant allows ceramics students an opportunity to experience a traditional firing technique (Raku) which will result in a more inclusive understanding of the range of effects one may achieve with ceramics. The equipment purchased with the grant allows students to compare the effects of outdoor firing on clays to that of modern electric kiln firings.

Floraganza — Karen Sondak, Horticulture and Environmental Science Teacher. The \$380 grant will partially fund a field trip for the Horticulture and Environmental Science students to visit the Philadelphia International Flower Show in March. Students will be able to visit the world's largest indoor flower show and view the displays in a unique setting, have the opportunity to further their understanding of the horticultural industry and attend lectures and presentations.

Culinary Creations — Sandy Levine, Culinary Arts, International Cultures and Cuisines and Food Trends Technology Teacher. One aspect of the International Cultures and Cuisines and Food Trends and Technology class is the opportunity for students to have hands-on experiences to broaden their skill base and encourage their creativity. This \$180 grant provides for six Cuisinart Classic Round Waffle Makers, thus maximizing the opportunity for students to have successful cooking experiences in the six kitchen labs.
