(Side note: Ever curious what manna tastes like? Hopefully it was somewhat tasty if the Israelites had to eat it every morning.)


But back to the lib's Keynesian model.


"It's the fatuous notion that you get yourself richer by transferring money from the economy's left pocket to the economy's right pocket," noted Mitchell.
