

## Hillary Clinton proposes new federal agency to help immigrants

Bernie Sanders have been competing in a tense battle for NY voters over the past couple of weeks, and both candidates are spending significant time in the state before voters there cast their ballots Tuesday. Clinton's campaign has worked to organize Latinos around **New York** City since kicking off her Empire State campaign last month and put some of the campaigns' top Latino aides on the effort.

The announcement comes on the same day that Clinton is expected to receive an endorsement from the **New York** State Immigrant Action Fund, an immigrant rights group.

Immigrant Action's board president Mary Chen elaborated on the track record praised by Choi. The group's diversity mirrors the demographics of **New York** City, marking a boost for Clinton ahead of next week's primary that extends beyond the burgeoning political power of the Latino voting bloc.

Trump said he would force Mexico to pay for his planned wall in the border by blocking the remittances from Illegal immigrants to their family in their country.

Her support for the Latino community is contrasted with dark images of Donald Trump as the narrator remarks that he calls immigrants "criminales y violadores", or criminals and rapists.

- Provide \$15 million in competitive grants for community efforts to increase immigrant applications to naturalize and to apply for deportation relief through programs created through President Barack<u>Obama's</u> executive action.

At the official announcement on Tuesday morning at the SEIU offices in Midtown Manhattan, Clinton said the new department, "would build on the work of the Obama administration task force to create a dedicated place in White House to coordinate policies across the federal government and with state and local governments as well".

- Significantly increase federal "resources" for English language and citizenship education.

Alex Nowrasteh, immigration policy analyst at the Cato Institute, told FoxNews.com that adding more bureaucracy was not going to do anything.

In the current campaign, Clinton changed her position and supports granting driver's licenses to undocumented immigrants.

Further details were not announced by Clinton or her campaign staff. The Clinton campaign did not respond to FoxNews.com's requests for details on what the office would do, or how much it would cost.

"When we need to go to the hospital or we need to have food, go shopping for groceries, we have no access to cars [or] transportation because we live in rural areas", he said.
