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


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Driving the Conversation:

What is the most significant obstacle President Obama faces in achieving his proposed overhaul of the U.S. health care system?

As other Arena contributors have noted, therefore, the most serious obstacle Obama faces is that most Americans are basically satisfied with the system we have, with all its faults, especially when they consider the proposed alternatives. Medicare and Medicaid "succeed" only because they foist the true costs of service on to the private sector. Reduce the size of that sector, or impose ever greater costs on it, and we're in a death spiral that can end only in a fully public system and the rationing of health care that afflicts every such system in the world. "Miracle drugs" we take for granted, for example, however expensive, are simply unavailable under many socialized systems. Obama may walk on water for the likes of Newsweek's Evan Thomas – "he's sort of God," said Thomas after the Cairo speech – but not even God can amend the laws of economics.

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
