SEC Reports First FCPA Enforcement Statistics

The SEC has announced a record of <u>735 enforcement actions</u> filed in fiscal year 2011 in total. In addition, since the formation of its <u>Foreign Corrupt Practices Act Unit in 2009</u> to enforce the law which prohibits bribing foreign officials for business purposes, the SEC recorded its first 20 <u>FCPA</u> enforcement actions in the fiscal year.

These enforcement statistics come in light of Assistant Attorney General Lanny Breuer's <u>announcement</u> that DOJ's criminal division will "release detailed new guidance on the Act's criminal and civil enforcement provisions." There are many however, like Cato Institute's <u>Walter Olson</u>, who make the case that "<u>clarification is not enough</u>" advocating wider reform or even repeal.
