Even Right Wing Think Tanks See the Benefits of Comp. Immigration Reform

In a new report released yesterday, **Restriction or Legalization?** Measuring the Economic Benefits of Immigration Reform, the right-wing Cato Institute seeks to quantify the benefits that would flow to the U.S. economy from comprehensive immigration reform which grants some form of legal status to undocumented immigrants already living in the United States.

The report constructs seven statistical models to simulate various immigration policy options that run the gamut from enforcement-only strategies along the border and at the workplace, to the legalization of currently unauthorized immigrants and creation of legal channels for future immigrant workers that accommodate actual U.S. labor demand. The report concludes that "compared to either border or interior enforcement, a policy of legalization would, over time, raise the incomes of U.S. workers and their families."

- A program to grant legal status to undocumented workers already in the United States, combined with new channels for the arrival of immigrant workers in the future, would increase the productivity of immigrant workers and create more job openings for American workers in higher-skilled occupations. The net result would be economic gains of roughly \$180 billion over ten years.
- An enforcement-only approach would shrink the overall economy, reducing opportunities for higher-skilled American workers. The net result would be economic losses of roughly \$80 billion over ten years.

Based on recent comments by President Obama and Congressman Langevin, it sounds like the immigration debate will heat up towards the end of this year.
