You Might Be a Terrorist, Too

<u>Cato's David Rittgers</u> rounds up cases of terrorist "fusion centers" erring on the side of labeling, well, pretty much everyone, a potential terrorist.

The North Texas Fusion System <u>labeled Muslim lobbyists</u> as a potential threat; a DHS analyst in Wisconsin thought <u>both pro- and anti-abortion activists</u> were worrisome; a Pennsylvania homeland security contractor watched <u>environmental activists</u>, <u>Tea Party groups</u>, and a Second Amendment rally; the Maryland State Police put <u>anti-death penalty and anti-war activists</u> in a federal terrorism database; a fusion center in Missouri thought that <u>all third-party voters and Ron Paul supporters</u> were a threat; and the Department of Homeland Security described <u>half of the American political spectrum</u> as "right wing extremists."

The ACLU fusion center <u>report</u> and <u>update</u> lay out some good background on these issues, and the <u>Spyfiles report</u> describes how monitoring lawful dissent has become routine for police departments around the nation.

I believe this is the part where right wingers justify including anti-war and environmental groups on these lists, and left wingers justify including Tea Partiers, anti-abortion activists, and Second Amendment advocates.
