On Friday, a three-judge panel of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the D.C. Circuit held that President Obama's recent appointment to the National Labor Relations Board violated the Constitution. Because of the political consequences of this decision, as well as the split among the members of this three-judge panel, there is a strong possibility that this case will ultimately reach the Court.
