

Rise & Shine: City adds two 'failing' schools to turnaround plans to fend off receivership

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School Improvement

Two schools have been added to the city's broadening school-improvement initiative and will receive an extra \$1.9 million in support next year, months after the state flagged them as "persistently failing" for posting dismal academic track records for the last decade.
