Anecdotal evidence, from the public schools where my wife has taught, suggest that we shouldn't be so quick to give parents the benefit of the doubt. McCluskey may be right that most folks believe " you can never spend too much on the children," so long as it's *you* who is doing the spending. Perhaps a better slogan would be, "Everyone else can never spend too much on the children."
