Argentina's Supreme Court today decriminalized personal use of small amounts of marijuana, saying, "The state cannot establish morality.'

"Each adult is free to make lifestyle decisions without the intervention of the state," the court ruled, throwing out jail terms for eight people convicted of having marijuana cigarettes.

"Behavior in private is legal, as long as it doesn't constitute clear danger," Supreme Court President Ricardo Lorenzetti said.

The court did not define small-scale use and did not decriminalize all drug use.

The Buenos Aires Herald notes the ruling states that "only adults would be allowed to use marijuana as long as they do it in a private environment, and without affecting third parties."

Last week, Mexico decriminalized possession and use of small amounts of marijuana and other drugs. Colombia has similar laws, and Brazil and Ecuador are considering legalizing some drug use.

The libertarian Cato Institute highlights the section of the Argentine Constitution that was at issue.






