
# These 31 charts will destroy your faith in humanity

Earlier this week, Rob Wile of Business Insider posted his graph-heavy opus: "31 Charts That Will Restore Your Faith In Humanity."



1) Inter-state wars are on the rise since 2002. Zoom in on that pink line:











Life Expectancy in the 20th Century





Note: Data labels shown for 1981, 1993, 2000 and 2010.



Victimizations per 100,000 people ages 12 and older









GLOBAL POVERTY, 1980–2001



























