

Well, one way is for both the local and national officials to <u>refuse to certify the results of the election</u> and try to ram unpopular programs with the votes of rejected legislators. Would Democrats try to do that with more elections looming in just 10 months? Harry Reid and Barney Frank say

absolutely not. Expect a lot of scrambling this week.
