# Attack on the Springs

Re: "Colorado Springs under attack by mainstream press," Our View, Feb. 16), It's clear that our city is in the cross-hairs of the battle between advocates of higher taxes and those who champion freedom. Those in the former camp often use fairness as a proxy to justify raising taxes. But not all that long ago most Americans tacitly understood that life is often unfair, but that with hard work and perseverance individuals can overcome profound adversities and thereby develop previously untapped sources of strength.

Today, we seemed to be governed by a new civic code, one that equates fairness with a robust government response to problems across the spectrum, with little understanding of government's rightful role and no demand for individual responsibility. However, there are always casualties in such battles, and in this instance the virtues of thrift, discipline, and delayed gratification have sustained mortal wounds. That advocates of higher taxes and regulation support a fully functional statist government is obvious since they lobby for government expansion with equal fervor whether the economy is in recession or booming.

It's instructive to remember that it wasn't always thus, that our forebears better understood the virtues of limited government. In a 1996 work published by the Cato Institute titled "Business and the Fight for a Free Society," Theodore J. Forstmann and Edward H. Crane, wrote: "Statist society promises your happiness in exchange for the better part of your freedom. Civil society merely guarantees your freedom. Happiness is up to you."
