

The WLG is affiliated with the national organization, the State Policy Network (SPN). The Cato Institution is another think tank under the SPN's national umbrella.

The Cato Institute, incidentally, gave Gov. Dave Freudenthal a "D" grade in 2008, for his spending policies.

The WLG "is a traditional public policy think tank and will produce papers on various issues," Ware said last week of the WLG.

The group is interested in core constitutional issues, free speech and will focus mostly on state rather than federal issues.

"We are looking at health care issues and the health care budget," Ware added. "We're looking at taxation issues, at trends over the past 10 years and how taxes have affected economic growth. We've been tracking the impact and results of the stimulus money that is going to Wyoming."

According to the Equality State Policy Center Web site, that group is a "progressive think tank" that uses research, public education and advocacy to help maintain accountability in state government and increase citizen participation and influence.

The Wyoming Heritage Foundation/Wyoming Business Alliance was established in 1979 to promote Wyoming's traditional businesses and industries.

The group continues to advocate on behalf of the business community.

"To advance this mission, it facilitates leadership development, promotes education and responsible debate, convenes public forums, researches viable alternatives, and recommends policy actions," according to the organization's Web site.

By the traditional definition, its mission makes the Wyoming Heritage Foundation/Wyoming Business Alliance a think tank, too.

Back to McGann, meanwhile, who wrote an interesting report despite his snub of Wyoming's think tanks.

The McGann report said there are 1,777 think tanks in the United States, including 374 based in Washington, D.C.

Think tanks started to show up in the 1960s and 1970s and exploded in the 1980s.

Today, they are considered the most comprehensive source of information globally for policy makers, the report said.
