
### **Get Your Constitution Here**


This week in the magazine, Jill Lepore writes about the Constitution, and about that "minor American artform," "crying constitution," wherein patriotic types invoke the forty-four-hundred-word document in arguing for whatever truths they hold to be self-evident. Sometimes, politicians (specifically John Boehner) don't know that the phrase "we hold these truths to be self-evident" comes from the Declaration of Independence, not the Constitution, but it hardly matters to their constituents: Lepore reports that in a poll of one thousand Americans, seventy-two per cent had never read the entire Constitution (a fact which, she notes, doesn't keep them from loving it). If you haven't read the Constitution lately, Lepore advises that you do so: it's a surprising read that "doesn't exactly explain itself." Below, a few editions mentioned in the piece, plus some books to aid (or perhaps hinder) your understanding.


