Jim Kluber claims the Federation for American Immigration Reform's research and analytics should be disregarded because an obscure website called mediabiasfactcheck.com judges FAIR to have a well-defined point of view on immigration policy ("Facts' from hate group disregard the truth," Letters, Aug. 7).

Neither Kluber nor his "source" challenges FAIR's methodology. He doesn't offer any alternative way of measuring the costs and challenges associated with illegal immigration.
