* Andrew Young, erstwhile aide to former Democratic presidential candidate and North Carolina [Sen. John Edwards](#) and author of "The Politician: An Insider's Account of [John Edwards's](#) Pursuit of the Presidency and the Scandal That Brought Him Down": Mr. Young said he wasn't surprised by a news report that a federal grand jury is ready to indict his former boss, pointing out that jurors have been thorough and diligent in their almost yearlong investigation into possible campaign violations related to Mr. Edwards paying his mistress, Rielle Hunter.

* Liz Cheney, daughter of former Vice President Dick Cheney and founder of [KeepAmericaSafe.com](#): Ms. Cheney explained her organization's release of a video that questions activities of Justice Department lawyers in the Obama administration who advocated for detained terrorism suspects during the Bush administration.

* Tad DeHaven, federal and state budget analyst for the **Cato Institute**: On the heels of the U.S. Postal Service warning this week that it could lose \$238 billion over the next 10 years and perhaps cancel Saturday delivery, Mr. DeHaven encouraged competition and even privatization for mail delivery services in the United States.

* Marshall Goldsmith, author of "Mojo: How to Get It, How to Keep It, How to Get it Back if You Lose It": Mr. Goldsmith, a leading executive coach, defined "mojo" as the "moment when we do something that's purposeful, powerful and positive" and other people recognize it, regardless of whether the moment is created, maintained or recaptured.
