grand strategy to advance U.S. national security. He is also the author of *Exiting Iraq: How the U.S. Must End the Occupation and Renew the War against Al Qaeda* and *John F. Kennedy and the Missile Gap*. In addition to his books, Preble has published over 100 articles in major publications including *USA Today*, the *Financial Times*, the *Wall Street Journal*, the *Philadelphia Inquirer, Reason*, the *National Interest*, the *Foreign Service Journal*, and the *Harvard International Review*. He has also appeared on many television and radio news networks including CNN, MSNBC, Fox News Channel, NPR, and the BBC. Before joining Cato in February 2003, he taught history at St. Cloud State University and Temple University. Preble was a commissioned officer in the U.S. Navy and is a veteran of the Gulf War, having served onboard USS Ticonderoga (CG-47) from 1990 to 1993. Preble holds a Ph.D. in history from Temple University.
