Hillary Clinton Calls for \$275 Billion in Federal Infrastructure Spending

Front-runner Hillary Clinton promises to install more than 500 million solar panels across the country.

“She’s the best-qualified candidate in my opinion that’s running for office right now, with the challenges that our country faces”, Walsh told the Herald yesterday.

“I will find a way”, she said. She now leads Sanders by 20 points nationally, with the support of 54 percent of Democrats versus 34 percent for the US senator from Vermont, according to the most recent Reuters/Ipsos polling.

Dennis Hale, also a Boston College political science professor, said Clinton’s high-profile hobnobbing and upper middle-class background runs counter to Walsh’s average Joe appeal.

Her plan, she added, is “a down payment on our future”. “She had to maximize her earning potential”.

If Clinton is hoping to have the significant weight of the Black Lives Matter cause backing her campaign rather than standing against it, she has her work cut out for her.

She said she wants to repay Sanders for joining a picket in New Hampshire last winter during a strike against the communications company FairPoint and for inviting the workers to dinner afterward. Barack Obama. But she did. The US may not be in a recession yet, but the economic recovery is very anemic.

Like Sanders, Clinton opposes drilling in the fragile Arctic region, which she calls “a unique treasure”. Along with the \$275 billion in infrastructure funds, she plans to call for new investments in manufacturing and research in the coming weeks.

“There’s cost overruns and all sorts of mismanagement with federal infrastructure spending”, said Chris Edwards, director of tax policy studies at the conservative Cato Institute.

Lorella Praeli, the campaign’s director of Hispanic media, said that at the retreat over the weekend, many Latina supporters talked about Clinton’s gun control and substance-abuse plans.

Late in her speech, Clinton picked up the ball. I'm serious about that, she even had to fight harder to get me.

"I'm the only Democrat in this race pledged to raise your income, not your taxes", Clinton said at an earlier event in Boston. "I've done that, too, on a very large stage".

Her top two contributors over those years were employees from Citigroup and Goldman Sachs, the center found.

She has vast experience in health care policy. "No one knew the effects of the bad mortgages on the financial system". Known as Glass-Steagall, it was repealed in 1999 during her husband's administration.

A separate tax would be levied on high-frequency trading, and she has vowed tougher criminal penalties for individuals who break the rules.

The new federal spending would be paid for by closing corporate loopholes, according to her campaign, which did not detail which tax breaks would be targeted. The Center for American Progress says that the eventual candidate needs to win 47% of Latinos' support to win the general election, higher than even former President George W. Bush's 44% level in 2004.

Clinton has been the subject of several congressional inquiries into her role as secretary of state and use of a private email server.

Don Fowler, a former National Committee chairman and one of the state's three members of the Democratic National Committee, has been a longtime Clinton supporter.

Donors working in the finance and insurance industry have given \$22 million to Texas Sen.

But while Clinton has clear advantages over her opponents, some S.C. Democrats are placing their bets elsewhere – preferring to back the underdog U.S. Sen. It argued that someone on Twitter made the connection between Wall Street donations and 9/11, not Clinton.
