A new Cato Institute study says the educratic establishment has misled the public about real spending per pupil. The nation's government schools "are spending 93 percent more than the estimated median private school."

Cato scholar Adam Schaeffer says "real per-pupil spending (is) on average 44 percent higher than the figure obtained from district publications or personnel."
